Eleven persons are believed to have lost their lives in floods sweeping the Northwestern Missouri today. Scores are in danger of drowning, and thousands of heads of cattle are lost, and property loss is appalling. Fire added to the horror at Pattonsburg, Mo., where two houses were burned.

All business in Pattonsburg is stopped and the people are beginning to suffer from hunger. Stocks of provisions are ruined by the water. Provisions are being rushed to the flood zone from the surrounding towns in a special train as near it can go.
