The next general gathering in which the entire county is directly interested will be Pioneer Day at Imbler on the 26th. The Imbler committee is already preparing for the event and being centrally located unless weather conditions are unfavorable Pioneer Day will be largely attended.

The next move on the part of our Commercial club will be the taking up of the matter of the coming county fair. If it is to be held in La Grande it is time that the matter be taken up and active work commenced. It will require a great deal of hard work on the part of our citizens to pull off a fair, such as those deeply interested in the matter desire.

Several of our United States Senators and Congressmen, whose reputation for oratory is general will be glad to see this special session of congress adjourn so they may fill their dates at the Chataqua meetings. Not a few make more money during their usual vacation period than they make during their entire term of office. If congress continues throughout the summer Mr. Bryan will be justified in raising his rates.
