## TABERNACLE CHOIR APPEARANCE ASSURED

The famous Mormon Tabernacle choir of Salt Lake City which is the largest body of organized church singers in the world, will pass through La Grande August 23, en route to compete at the big elistedfort at the A-Y-P. fair at Seattle. The possibilities are that the choir will stop over in this city and give a concert on the evening of August 23rd.

George E. Carpenter, city editor of the Deseret News, of Salt Lake, arrived in town this morning ahead of the choir and met with the members of the Commercial club at 4 p. m., and it is expected that the club will exert its influence and energy in securing this world renowned musical aggregation.

Union county will be greatly honored if the Commercial club is successful and with a record of success written on its banner we know that it will add another laurel to the list of its victories when at the conclusion of the meeting this afternoon the date of the great concert will be definitely fixed.

In order to rest the singers one stop will be made between Salt Lake and Portland and the choice lies between Baker City and La Grande with La Grande an easy winner with the big auditorium and pipe organ and the offer of the local Latter Day Saint church authorities to assist in entertaining the visitors.

The Tabernacle choir proper consists of over 500 voices. On the two weeks trip to the Northwest 250 selected voices will be carried in addition to four soloists and Prof. J. J. McClellan, the Tabernacle organist whose masterly playing on the La Grande pipe instrument delighted local music lovers when the Tabernacle was first opened.

The soloists with the choir will include Alfred Best, tenor, who is now on his way from Germany where he has been singing in grand opera; Lizzie Thomas Edward, soprano; Miss Barnes, contralto, and H. S. Ensign, baritone. Prior to appearing at the Seattle fair the big chorus sings at the Baker theatre, Portland; the Tacoma theatre and the Seattle concert hall.

The choir is under the direction of Evan Stephens, whose reputation as a trainer of choruses is universal throughout the country. It was under his able batin that the Mormon singers carried off the prize for the World's Fair, Chicago, several years ago. Besides being a musical director Prof. Stephens is a composer of note, and the choir will render several of his compositions here in addition to the works by the old masters.

The choir will travel in a special pullman train which will carry in addition to the singers about 100 prominent Salt Lakers bound for the fair. In connection with the appearance here of the choir there will be excursions run from Baker City and other points, and it is anticipated that there will be a big reunion held. The special arrives early in the morning and leaves at midnight and during the stay here the visitors will be entertained by the local members of the Latter Day Saints church.

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
