The big drive is to be under the leadership of Gilbert Minthorn, one of the best known young Indians on the reservation, and with about 100 Indian cowboys in the saddle the event promises to be one of the most picturesque of many years.
The object of the roundup is to enable Montana horse buyers to select a trainload of the Indian horses. At least 25 car loads are wanted by the buyers and more will be taken if they can be secured.

MYSTERY UNSOLVED

PENDLETON, July 20.—The East Oregonian said last night: Notwithstanding the many remarkable coincidences in connection with the two mysterious cases, the body of the giant which occupies an unknown grave in the Olney cemetery is not that of Curt Pless, the missing grain broker of Bellingham, Washington, in the belief of Coroner Ralph Folsom. The cause for his changed opinion is the receipt of a letter from Mrs. Pless in which she gives a more detailed description of the missing man than has yet been received here.

There are three main points of difference in the description, but these are now declared to be sufficient. Curt Pless did not wear a moustache and his hair was a very light blonde. He had a deep scar below the eye as the result of a gunshot wound. The body of the man found floating in the Columbia river and whose description otherwise tallied perfectly, wore a dark brown moustache and had dark brown hair. The remains were carefully examined for scars or marks of any kind and none were found.

LESS WORK.

Better Results, Only Irrigates His Lawn Every Three Weeks.

Once in three weeks is often enough to water a lawn and keep it in the best of condition on the driest soil in Spokane, says R. A. Jones, proprietor of the Riverside nurseries, Spokane. Mr. Jones has reached this conclusion after experiments covering several years in his business.

In watering every 21 days Mr. Jones applies one and a fourth gallons per square foot, which averages about one-seventeenth of a gallon a day. This is considerably less than W. R. Roy finds it necessary to use when watering his lawn daily, as Mr. Roy applies one-thirteenth of a gallon to the square foot.

If the owner of a lawn were able to make a success of Mr. Jones' plan he would not only use less water, but would be troubled with watering his grass only every three weeks.
