TWO NEW POST OFFICES ON THE JOSEPH BRANCH

Two new post offices will soon be established on the Joseph line. At Roundowa, John Anthony will be postmaster and at Palmer Junction, Gay Byrkit will be the government's representative. The La Grande office has not yet received instructions from the department to deliver mail to the new offices, but probably will within a few days. In regard to the establishment of the office at Roundowa, Mr. Anthony has had grief almost without limit, having had to prepare and forward

three bonds before one was accepted by the department. This delay, however, was not caused by any fault with the bonds or the parties. The first one was made out for the office of river junction, and when the name was changed to Roundowa a new bond had to be secured. This was lost in the Omaha hold-up, and after the third set of papers had been forwarded the stolen ones were found and returned to Mr. Anthony.

ARBITRATION BOARD VISITS LAND UNDER DISCUSSION

Accompanied by J. D. McKennon and W. H. Bohnenkamp, the arbitration committee selected by Mr. Hill and the Grande Ronde Reservoir Co. to settle their differences regarding the price to be paid for Mr. Hill's farm, which will be covered with many feet of water when the dam at Meadowbrook is completed, left this morning in the Bohnenkamp auto for the site of the dam. The board of arbitration, consisting of W. J. Townley of Union, Mr. McNabb of Pendleton and Frank Pfy of La Grande, will carefully examine the property in question before giving any decision as to the value. They will probably return late this evening, and it is likely that a meeting of the directors of the irrigation enterprise will be called sometime tomorrow to take action upon their report.
