The stand testifying relative to the facts regarding local option violations; that a campaign must be instituted and that this was the purpose of this organization to bring about a change. He stated that he was informed that a witness before the last grand jury informed him that he swore that he knew of three violations of the law in a certain drug store and yet the grand jury brought in no true bill. The way the Dr. handed it to this class of violators, who under the guise of respectable business dealing, so violated their trust, was couched in no uncertain language. The speaker paid a high compliment to District Attorney Ivanhoe, whom he believed was trying to do his duty and that this organization stood behind every officer who did their duty, but it was also the object of this organization to see that they did. The encore that followed this straight out-and-out address, reflected true sentiment of those whose attendance meant something.

"Good Citizenship," was the subject of the address of A. S. Geddes. He pleaded for higher conditions, for better schools for the doing away of the places of vice which tears down the home; for a city that would appeal to the homemaker where he could locate with the assurance that his boys and daughters would be free from danger. Mr. Geddes picture of the ideal home, where love, virtue and greatest blessing that God could give, boys and girls was the highest possible citizenship and it devolved upon every county to eliminate everything that took away the blessing of such a home. He pleaded for a cleaner La Grande and Union county.

At the conclusion of the program, Geo. Stoddard, who presided as chairman, remarked that he stood emphatic for everything that had been said, and stood ready to assist in every way possible to bring about the desired condition.

Rev. Ford Ellis of the Christian church pronounced the benediction and one of the most enthusiastic meetings ever gathered in this city, whose object it was to bring about better enforcement of law, adjourned. It is the desire of this organization to have each vicinity in the county organize similarly, and when so organized to form a county organization.
