## PICKLER AWARDED WORK OF GETTING CONTOUR MAP

Another step of the many in the course of red tape for actual construction of the government building here, has been taken by the government. Civil Engineer L. A. Pickler's bid for making up a contour map of the government site, has been accepted by the postoffice department according to the information received by Postmaster Richey today.

Mr. Pickler will do the work this week, as it is not a very arduous one. It calls for drawing maps of every detail as to location with other buildings, the lay of the ground, and a batch of technical data.

## OREGON LUMBERMEN UNITED

WILL SELL PRODUCTS THROUGH A REGULAR ASSOCIATION.

All But One of The Big Companies Join Movement.

PORTLAND, July 27.—Ten or more leading lumber companies of Portland, and the Columbia river, are planning to organize a co-operative selling company such as was formed by Centralia Mills, those of Gray and Willapa harbors, which sells products to the information received by Postmaster Richey today.

Principal ones of Hoquiam, Aberdeen, Willapa, South Bend, Wn., and Raymond.

It is understood that with one exception, the principal companies of Portland and Oregon will enter the consolidation. The Inman Poulson company may be the exception.

Hog Prices Broken.

PORTLAND, July 27.—Hogs advanced to \$9.50 per hundred pounds in the Portland stock yards today, the highest price ever reached. This beats all previous records by 35 cents. The record was made during the past 24 hours.

## IS NEARING

GREAT DEMAND FOR FISHING LICENSES THIS YEAR.

Grouse Season Opens in Two Weeks—Sagehens Sunday.

What chance has the poor trout, anyway? In this county more than 650 persons have applied for and received a license to fish. If each of the anglers is so fortunate as to make one good catch, say of 50 trout, and many will exceed that number many times over, there will have been removed from the streams 32,500 fish. It is altogether probable that so many have already been caught.

Hunters have not been so eager, only 150 licenses having been issued. Of course the hunting season has not yet opened, and will not until next Sunday, August 1st. After that one may kill not more than five sagehens in one day, nor more than 10 in one week. It is lawful to kill no other game birds until two weeks later, when the grouse season opens. The limit on grouse is the same as for sagehens.

### Thaw Scores a Point.

WHITE PLAINS, July 27.—Jerome, in the inquiry into the sanity of H. K. Thaw, today made a unsuccessful attempt to force Dr. Evans, to state he did not believe Thaw was sane now. Jerome had admitted into the court report once made by Evans to Attorney Hartridge, Thaw's former counsel in which the alienist said Thaw was subject to "brain storms." Evans said that the remark was not based on examination of Thaw.
