RAIN AIDS MOST GRAIN

LITTLE DAMAGE TO HAY IN THE SWATH OR SHOCK.
Second Alfalfa Crops Will Benefit Greatly.

Now that the rain is about over, investigation shows that the damage to grain is trifling, while the benefit to the second crop of alfalfa and spring grain is incalculable. Heavy winds, the first of which occurred July 25th, knocked down a good deal of fall wheat, but the headers will be able to pick up most of that, and but little was knocked down by the rain. Very little hay, and most of that grain hay, was down or in shape to be damaged. Altogether Union county farmers are richer by many thousands of dollars by reason of the rain.
