## TO INSPECT FIRE ESCAPES

LA GRANDE TO PATTERN AFTER PORTLAND ESCAPES.

No Compliance With New Law Until After Portland Visit.

Now that the amended fire escape ordinance is effective, Chief Jones of the fire department and other city officials are attending to strict enforcement of the provisions. The ordinance is patterned after the state law, and to have the escapes built properly and according to the most modern plans, Doctor M. K. Hall, the city's executive, will inspect fire escapes in Portland before new escapes are ordered built or wooden structures converted to steel here. With what information he gains there, he can lay down exact plans for building the escapes in this city. The inspection tour will be made within a week and on his return immediate changes and construction will follow.

### CAPTAIN AND CREW LOST.

Hope of Ever Finding Missing Tug Given up by Friends.

SEATTLE, July 28.—Through the Merchants Exchange the government has been asked to aid in the search for the tug Grayling. She was in charge of Captain Moore. She started from Panama May 27, and expected to make the voyage in 25 days. Mrs. Moore has appealed for a revenue cutter.

She carried six men besides the captain, and has not been heard from since they were sighted off Cape Blanch.

## A. THOMAS CHILD LOST

LUCILE THOMAS, AGED THREE WANDERS FROM HOME.

Found at Hospital While Trying to Gain Entrance There.

Terror and fright were visitors at the A. Thomas home, 1903 Second street, this forenoon when the little Lucile Thomas, aged three years, wandered away from home and for nearly four hours kept the parents, neighbors and city officials on a sharp search for the missing child. After the first futile search, it was feared that the girl had toddled off to the opening of the sewer on Fourth street and there carried under by the increased flow of water following the heavy rain.

Just before noon, however, a little tot knocked at the Grande Ronde hospital door, several blocks away, and "wanted in." She gave no reason for her summary visit to the place of sickness, but attendants at the hospital put an end to the short but painful agony of the parents by notifying Mrs. Thomas as soon as they ascertained the identity of the little visitor.

### PAGE HAWLEY NEAR DEAD.

 and after a hard chase Pratt and Burns outdistanced the other pursuers. About four miles down the river they overtook Hawley and, according to their own story, Hawley surrendered without any resistance. On the return trip to Copperfield the young horse thief fell from his horse, so Pratt and Burns allege, and received the injuries which will cause his death. His skull was badly fractured and other injuries were inflicted on his body.

Upon arriving in Copperfield Burns and Pratt turned the prisoner over to the proper officials, and told their story of his injuries. But it was evident that the people of that burg did not.

Evidently Assaulted.

After seeing the wounds of the dying man the people believed that he had met with too speedy justice, and had Pratt and Burns jailed. Hawley was questioned as to whether or not he was injured by his captors, and is reported to have said that he was. The physicians refused to make any statements incriminating the two men, but will be called before the coroner's jury at the inquest over the remains of the young man. It is expected that at that time some startling evidence will be given which will either clear the accused men or make a very strong case against them.
