RACE WITH GRIM DEATH

SPECIAL TRAIN WAS CHARTERED FROM ENTERPRISE.

Visiting Ohian Saved From Death by Operation.

Pitted against death, a special train in charge of Jack Heuhan's crew early this morning raced from Enterprise to the La Grande hospital in a tussle with grim death's advances on Mrs. Forsythe, aged 55 years, of Ohio, who has been in Enterprise visiting her sister, Mrs. E. J. Forsythe.

Last Saturday the Ohian was stricken with appendicitis of the worst kind, and grew rapidly worse. At 4:25 this morning a chartered train started toward La Grande bearing the dying patient with it, in charge of Doctor Anderson of Enterprise, and the lady's brother-in-law, E. J. Forsythe. At 7:30 the special reached La Grande and at 9 o'clock the operation was performed. At noon Doctor Anderson and N. Molitor of this city, who assisted the Enterprise physician, asserted that immediate danger has been passed. Gangrene had set in the effected parts, making the case all the more serious.

Hopes for recovery are now held out, and unless complications set in, Mr. Anderson will return to his home city tomorrow.

PIONEER MEETS VERY TRAGIC END

FALLS FROM BARN AT NORTH POWDER AND DIES OF FATAL INJURIES.

Leaves Large Family of Sons in The Region of North Powder.

L. S. Williams, aged 75 years and well to do, was killed at North Powder yesterday forenoon by a fall from a high scaffold on which he was working while constructing a barn for James Dalton of North Powder. A defective plank in the scaffolding precipitated him to the ground with such force that he died soon after. The fall occurred at 8 o'clock in the morning. He struck a rock headforemost, and was picked up in an unconscious condition. He was given all the medical attention possible, but died at noon.

His energetic disposition is responsible for his death. His financial stand did not require activity along so hazardous lines but he was always anxious to be active.

He is well known in La Grande, North Powder and Baker City, having lived in the last named city for several years.

He is survived by several sons who live in the region of North Powder.

The funeral took place this afternoon from the family home in Baker City.

RUSH FOR REPAIRS OF THRESHING MACHINERY.

Big Feedmill and Drill Being Constructed Here.

The La Grande Iron Works is kept busy these days in its various departments. Another week and the heavy castings which are being constructed for the Hunt Keys big drill to be used in the Vale oil fields will be completed. Today one of their large feed mills with a capacity of 120 tons per day, will be shipped to Mayville, Oregon, near Condon. The usual anti harvest work is on and many engines and threshers are being put in shape. In all nine men are employed taking care of the industrial territory tributary to this section.
