LAY UNDER DEAD BODY

Walla Walla Dispatch says: pinned
beneath the wreckage for over an
hour with the lifeless body of Mrs.
A. E. McDonald across his chest, D.
E. Jarman, a prominent merchant of
Weston, Oregon, escaped death in the
collision on the electric road near
Spokane Saturday afternoon by a mi-
racle. Jarman, who arrived in Walla
Walla last night, gives a graphic de-
scription of his harrowing experience
following the wreck. He said:

"I was sitting in the forward car at
the time when a man ahead of me
leaped from his seat and dashed to-
wards the rear of the car, crying wildly
for every one to jump for their lives.
Before I knew what was the matter,
the crash came. I remember seeing
the end of the car crumple up like
papier mache. Something struck me.
I knew nothing more until a few mo-
ments later I recovered conscious-
ness, to find myself pinned down by
heavy timbers.

The body of a woman who had
been sitting in the seat behind me lay
across my chest. A huge splinter
piercing her breast transfixed her.
For an hour or more I lay there lit-
erally weltering in the blood that
poured from the woman's body. Later
I was released and my injuries at-
tended to at a hospital."

Killing Near Baker.

News reached this city today noon
of the death of W. H. Turner, near
Carson about 9 o'clock this morning.
Whether the shooting was accidental
or whether he took his life is not
known, but it is generally believed
that he met death by accidental dis-
charge of his Winchester.

Mr. Turner started out in the hills
this morning with his gun and rope.
After he had been gone an hour his
lifeless body was found about a mile
from town by two little children, who
happened along that way. The report
of a gun was heard by the people of
that vicinity some little time before,
but no significance was attached to it
until the gruesome find was made.
The bullet had entered the forehead
and had apparently caused instant
death as the body was cold when
found by the children. An effort was
made to secure Coroner Ison of this
city, but he is out of town so the
justice of the peace was summoned
to hold the inquest. It is expected
that the inquest will show whether or
not the shooting was accidental or
whether it was deliberate.—Baker
City Herald.
