## JOHNS IS RETICENT

RUMORED GUBERNATORIAL TIMBER UNDECIDED.

Not Ready to Make Definite Announcement Either Way.

Chas. A. Johns, an attorney of Baker City, is in La Grande today attending to business. Mr. Johns is one of the most prominent lawyers and politicians of the state and the report is that he will seek the nomination for Governor of Oregon in the coming election. At present there is only one candidate announced for the high honors although there are several others who have heard the bee buzzing close to their bonnets. Grant B. Dimick, county judge of Clackamas county has announced his intentions of becoming an active candidate.

Judge Geo. H. Burnett of Salem, and Mayor Simon, of Portland, are also talked of as likely candidates and there are several others who are ready and willing to enter the race at the drop of the hat.

Mr. John's visit from Baker here today is purely a business one and has no connection with politics what ever. He is going on to Portland tonight.

While Johns would not deny, today, that he is a prospective candidate, he affirmed that he was not ready to make announcement one way or the other.

### Fire in Seattle.

SEATTLE, Aug. 4.—Fire this morning destroyed the Stetson and Post door factory, also an adjoining building of the Union Engine Works. The loss is \$35,000. The engine company's lost is \$25,000 in patterns. The origin is unknown.

## DEPOT NOT TO BE PAVED

FAVORABLE REPORT WILL BE HEARD TONIGHT.

Macadam Roads And Pavement on Adams Avenue is Recommended.

### Improved Districts.

- Pavement from Fourth to Spruce on Adams avenue.
- Macadam From Spruce on Adams to city limits where county macadam road commences.

When the street committee reports at tonight's council meeting on the resolution introduced some time ago relative to the street paving, that matter will come up for final action by the council. That it will pass tonight is very evident for Chairman Al Andrews and his committee on streets, have a report that will boost the resolution towards passage at a rapid gate.

There have been some changes since the ordinance was drafted originally. Depot street is not included in this improvement district and in its stead will come a very much needed road improvement. The report to be made tonight will call for pavement, on the ten-year payment plan, from Fourth street east on Adams avenue to Spruce a distance of about six blocks. From there on to the city limits where the county has commenced the construction of its macadam road, the resolution will call for macadam. There are about six blocks of this sort of improvement.

While a great majority of property owners on Adams avenue are in great favor of pavement, and that pavement is the one needed feature in the city are well known facts, but that the macadam road is also needed is another condition which exists. At present farmers coming over the macadam road with loads will suddenly bump into ruts and in the winter, into mud holes. Macadam roads up to the pavement will reduce the bad roads of the east side of La Grande very materially.

It is absolutely essential for the welfare of the city's growth that pavement policies be adopted, but it is also essential that the macadam work be done on Adams avenue.

If the resolution passes, which seems very probable, three appraisers will be named from the council to appraise the abutting property and then the advertisement for bonds will follow. It will be a short process before dirt is flying on this project, if the council adopt the report on the paving resolution tonight.

Final action on near beer licenses and regulations of near beer saloons is another important feature for tonight.

## WILL MEET TONIGHT

The finance committee of the fair commission will meet tonight at 8 o'clock at the Commercial club rooms and transact some very important business. Ways and means will be devised for the raising of the \$5000 guarantee fund necessary to hold the fair. It is thought that the raising of the necessary amount will not be difficult. All members are urged to be present at the meeting.

### Chief Shippy Resigns.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—Chief of Police Shippy has resigned today on account of ill health, and is going on a vacation. Bernard Mullany, secretary to the mayor, will be the probable successor.

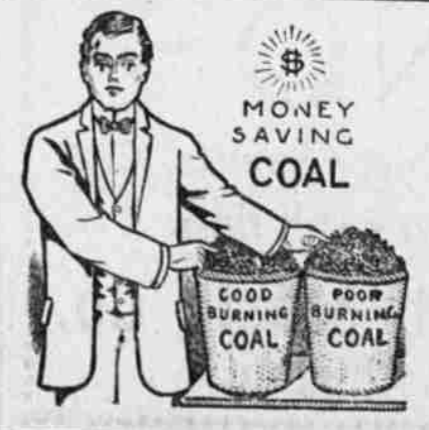
