Here two methods of procedure present themselves. The council may, after the bids for construction have been let, declare a lien on the abutting property to be paid in bulk or in installments, or they may sell improvement bonds which can also be paid on the installment plan.

As to Intersections.

The charter provides that the four corner property owners on any intersection can be assessed for the cost of improving the intersections. The council also provides, that if the council so pleases it may from its general fund pay for the cost of constructing the intersection pavement or, too, for a portion of the improvement all along the way, and assess property holders for the balance of the last.

INTEREST IN THE TRIP

An additional couple of Pullman cars have been secured for the special train which is to carry the Tabernacle choir on its trip to Seattle. To date nearly 100 applications for berths have been turned in to the secretary, George C. Smith, at the presiding bishop's office, this week.

Arrangements have been made with the Oregon Short Line and the Northern Pacific to make the tickets good for 30 days to such as do not wish to return with the choir which under present arrangements will leave Seattle after the steamer trip on Sunday, August 29, for home. Any of the members of the choir or their friends who accompany them on the special may return via San Francisco, providing arrangements are made with the railroad company prior to the special train leaving Salt Lake for the northwest. The railroads have conceded this upon the payment of \$23 in addition. These two points make the trip more popular than ever and it is safe to say that the secretary will at the last have to refuse the tardy ones who failed to get their reservations during the coming next 10 days.

The special train will pull out of Salt Lake Saturday, August 21, at 8 p. m., from the Oregon Short Line depot and will arrive at Boise about 9:30 the next morning. Here a stop will be made and the excursionists will take in the sights prior to the sacred concert at the Pinney theatre in the evening.—Desert News, (Salt Lake.)

DIVIDENDS PAID OUT

Less than \$100 remain in the receiver's hands as dividend checks on the first payment made by the receiver to depositors in the defunct institution. This balance is the remainder of the \$98,000, approximately, which the bank paid out to depositors. The \$100 or so remaining uncalled for are mostly small checks which the owners are neglecting to call for.
