GREAT CEREAL CROP.

This year's cereal crop will be among the greatest ever grown in the United States, according to the estimates contained in the August wheat, corn and cereal crop report issued today by the Department of Agriculture. A gain of more than 700,000,000 bushels in all grains over last year is indicated, and the bumper yield of three years ago will probably be exceeded.

Crops of corn and oats will likely smash all records. A loss in winter wheat as compared with a year ago will be offset by a larger yield of spring wheat, which will bring the total to a considerable excess over the 1908 crop. Some important interests in the trade figure that the consumptive demand has grown enough to absorb this difference and that before the entire crop is harvested we will run into a period of actual shortages rather than a surplus. It is also figured that foreign requirements easily will take all wheat which is not needed for domestic purposes, as crop conditions are generally understood to be unsatisfactory in most of the Old World grain raising districts.

HOT AND HUMID.

Thermometer Registers 92 Degrees at Noon Today.

With the government thermometer standing at 92 this afternoon and a general humidity of some intensity, the first real summer heat of the season has reigned in La Grande. Ninety-two degrees is right close to the high water mark for the summer, but few days if any, have been marked with humidity like today.

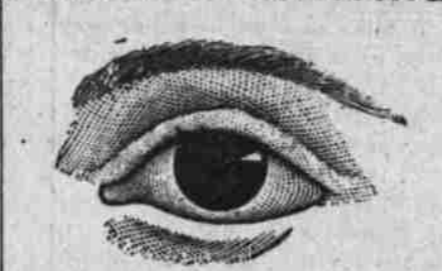
