The government is now trying to cancel these titles, and in order to do so have to produce evidence of the alleged conspiracy, and its that reason why Scriber, Thomson and Spenser must be brought into limelight here, that these titles can be cancelled.

It is not, of course, a civil proceedings against these three men to punish them for conspiracy, but simply a matter of proving the conspiracy existed that the titles may be cancelled. Big Lawyers Coming.

It is announced that one of the most prominent law firms on the coast is going to defend these men. The firm is Dolph, Mallory, Simon and Gearin, the noted Portland counsellors.

TRACK MEET UNDER WAY

SEATTLE, Aug. 13.—All visiting athletes who will participate in the great Amateur Athletes Union track and field, meet here this afternoon, are in this city today. Everything is ready for the struggle which will decide amateur athletic supremacy of the country, the east against west, promises to be the greatest in the history of the country.

The principal contenders are Multnomah of Portland, the Seattle A. C. and the Olympic club of San Francisco.

The weather is ideal and the track is fast.

The quarter mile is expected to be the best contest today. J. J. McEneaney of New York, A. C. is picked as a sure winner, but he will have to beat such men as Reid of Multnomah, Nelson of Boston, Edwards of New York and Florline of St. Louis.

Biggest Ever Held.

SEATTLE, Aug. 13.—(Special)—"I look for the most successful national championships we have ever held," said President J. E. Sullivan of the A. A. U. in speaking of the sectional championship track and field meet of the A. A. U. which will be held at the stadium of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition Friday and Saturday.

"It will be a great battle of the west against the east. The party of athletes from New York and Chicago is the largest that ever journeyed to the coast, and it will give your men out here a great run.

"A number of the eastern entries will be new to the western but when you see the men in action, you will realize that they are just as good as some of the stars of whom you have heard for years.

"The eastern athletes and those from the Olympic club of San Francisco, among whom is the famous Ralph Rose, are in the best of condition.

After a days training on the stadium track on Wednesday, most of them are now resting for the big event. The result of the meet is being awaited the country over as entries came from New York, Boston, Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Little Rock, Ark., Phoenix, Arizona, and in fact, every section of the United States. A number of crack athletes have been entered from Canada.
