A LONG TIME BETWEEN DRINKS

TWENTY-ONE COUNTIES TO DECIDE WET OR DRY.

South Carolina Has Important Local Option Election Today.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 17.—It has been a long time between drinks in South Carolina, but the adity which has settled like a pall over the Palmetto State may be partially lifted as a result of today's elections in twenty-one counties. The state has been entirely "dry" since August 2, when the dispensaries of the twenty-one "wet" counties were temporarily closed pending today's decision at the ballot box. It will probably be two weeks before the results are officially announced and the dispensaries in such counties as have determined to remain "wet" are reopened.

Twenty-one counties are already in the prohibition camp, and exactly the same number are officially engaged in the sale of intoxicants under the county dispensary system. The law enacted at the last session of the legislature took no account of the territory already dry, providing only for elections in the wet counties.

The Prohibitionists have made a strong fight and the contest is practically conceded to them, with the exception of Charleston and Richland counties, the state capital being located in the latter.

The "blind tiger" element of the state is in favor of prohibition, and has used its influence. South Carolina was dry during the period just after the abolishment of the state dispensary, of which Senator Tillman is called the "father."

The general assembly at its recent session passed a state prohibition law which went into effect on the first Tuesday of August in every county in the state, and every dispensary in South Carolina was closed on that day. It was then provided by this act that on the third Tuesday in August, there shall be held an election in every county now having dispensaries and if the election results in a majority for the sale of whisky the dispensaries in that county shall be reopened as before, but if there is a majority in any county for prohibition the dispensaries in that county shall be closed. The effect of this was to give absolute prohibition in every county in South Carolina for the two weeks between August 2 and today.
