GRANGES TO ASSIST FAIR

HAVE GRANGE BOOTH AND OTHER ATTRACTIONS.

Institute Education Work Here in September For The Year.

September will be education month for all Granges of Oregon, when, under the direction of State Superintendent Ackerman of Salem, Grange No. 17, a state wide crusade will be started for the betterment of rural schools. Blue Mt. Grange No. 346 of La Grande will hold an educational meeting on September 18. In addition to the local speakers, considerable outside talent has been secured. The afternoon session will be open meeting, and it is hoped that all the school boards will be represented and a number of rural teachers will be present.

The state programs for the following year have been sent to the subordinate lecturers. They cover a wide scope of subjects, all of general interest to the farmers. In arranging the programs State Lecturer J. J. Johnson was assisted by a number of the most prominent educators of the state. The reference department will be in care of Miss Carmella Marvin of the Oregon Library commission, who will superintend this work in person.

To Aid Local Fair.

The Granges of Union county will take an active part in the district fair this fall. Among other features planned is a booth containing a Grange display, representing practically every variety of farm products, to give visitors an idea of the possibilities in store for this valley by development of the agricultural resources.
