



CADETS WILL ONLY VISIT HERE FOR A BRIEF HOUR

George E. Carpenter, advance man for the famous Mormon Tabernacle choir, who arrived from Boise last night, this morning received advices from Salt Lake that the bookings for the choir special train were all complete and if any more excursionists are brought they will have to ride on the roof of the cars. The handsome special will be composed of nine pullmans, a chair car and a baggage car, and will positively come right through to La Grande without any disembarking in Idaho.

Cadets Sunday Night.

The train will leave Salt Lake at 8 p. m. tomorrow and a car filled with residents of Ogden will be taken on at the junction city. The high school cadets with their band leave Salt Lake tomorrow morning, and will arrive in La Grande Sunday evening. The boys will probably be given a breather around town for an hour and then resume their journey to Seattle where they go into camp on the edge of the lake in the A-Y-P. grounds.

Governor Here Monday.

Governor William Spry, his staff and several of Utah's prominent mining and business men leave Salt Lake Monday for Seattle and will make a brief stay in La Grande en route. This party is traveling in special

cars as the guests of Col. D. C. Jackling, the mining magnate, whom rumor hath has the senatorial bee buzzing in his mind.

In brief, there will be close upon 1,700 Utah people pass through La Grande within the next few days going to the fair to take part in the festivities incident to Utah Day which is set for next Thursday.

Reports from Salt Lake are to the effect that the chorus selected to compete at the eisteddfod at Seattle is the finest that has ever been collected in the State of Utah, which has been famous for its singers.

The choir was to have sung in Boise on Sunday night under a contract made with John Cort, the theatrical magnate. However, it was found on examining the statues of the State of

Idaho, that it is unlawful "to open" a theatre on Sunday. On the arrival of Mr. Carpenter in Boise, he was served with a notice by the county attorney that if the choir appeared at the Pinney theatre that arrests and prosecution would follow. "The choir has no intention of breaking the law," said Mr. Carpenter to the Observer this morning, "and consequently we cut Boise out of the itinerary and will lengthen our stay in La Grande instead."

"I am sure the crowd will be taken with La Grande. The preparation for their entertainment here promise a splendid time that will long be remembered by the visitors who will always have a good word to say regarding the people of this city. You may rest assured that the choir will give the best it has in return and the coming of the famous organization will be one of the musical events of years."

Mr. Carpenter left for Portland this morning, stating that there was no necessity for him to stay as apparently La Grande had thrown down the bars and the comfort and entertainment of the choir were more than assured and he was a superfluity as far as suggestions and the looking

after details were concerned.

The choir special on its arrival here will be switched to the Sugar factory track where all will be able to get a good quiet night's sleep prior to invading the city.
