COPPER KING IS COMING

JACKLIN AND GOVERNOR SPRY BOTH COMING IN A PALATIAL CAR.

Tonight with the second section of No. 9, comes Colonel D. C. Jackling, the copper king of Utah, as the special escort of Governor Will Spry of Utah. They will stop here only a few moments when they will proceed on their way to Seattle, where they will be in attendance on Utah Day at the fair. They are traveling in Col. Jackling's private car and A. E. Moseley, traveling passenger agent for the O. S. L. and the S. P., who is here today, affirms that it is the most palatial car in the world. Not even the Harriman private car comes up to the standard of this car in elegance and beauty.

Col. Jackling, who is several times a millionaire, contributed alone half of the expense of sending the large Utah delegation to Seattle. The expense of sending the cadets was met alone by this man.
