# GOOD WORK BEING DONE

TRAVELING MAN PRAISES WORK OF COMMERCIAL CLUB.

Termed That Organization The Liveliest in The Northwest.

H. K. Silversmith, Manager of the Department of the Northwest of the Pacific Monthly Publishing company, was in La Grande this morning and to put it as he did: "To talk to the Publicity Manager of the liveliest Commercial club in the Northwest."

"Every where that I go I hear of La Grande and good work that is being done by the Commercial club," said Mr. Silversmith. "In the towns and cities and in the train most everybody is asking me about La Grande and the Grande Ronde valley. People are going to the much-heralded Idaho lands but few purchase for in some places there has been a failure of crops, and in my opinion the visitor to the fair at Seattle, who on going home stop in Idaho, will finally drift back to Oregon in search of homes, and the work being done by the Commercial club is timely and of great effect."

# GET MONEY MAYBE

Crystal, head of the grocery department of the Peoples Warehouse, is trying to figure out whether he is about to come into possession of more than \$100,000 or whether he has been picked for a victim by some crooked artists. In the meantime, without running any risks he is going to make an investigation. If the apparent good fortune is genuine he will accept with pleasure, but if it is a bunco game he will refuse to be fleeced, says the E. O.

The cause of his perturbation was a lengthy letter which arrived this morning from Madrid, Spain. The writer represents himself to be a relative of Crystal and says that though he is now in prison on the charge of being an anarchist, that he now has more than \$450,000 in English drafts and that he will give one-fourth of this to Crystal on condition that the Pendleton groceryman receive into his home the 14-year-old daughter of the imprisoned man.

**Letter From Madrid.**  
The letter was posted in Madrid, and was sent to Medford, Oregon, the former home of Mr. Crystal. From there it was forwarded to Pendleton, arriving this morning. It bears the date of July 10.

The letter is signed Luis Rodriques Crystal.  
The writer starts off by saying that the recipient of the epistle will understand their relationship when he explains that his mother was Mrs. Mary Crystal, said to be a kinswoman of the Pendleton man. Mary Crystal is the name of the local man's grandmother, and if this is the same woman to whom the writer refers this would make him an uncle.

The conditions imposed are that the local groceryman shall receive the daughter and act as her protector until she becomes of age, or is married. Up until that time he is to receive the interest on the whole amount of the fortune, which is to be invested by the protector of the girl. When she becomes of age the original fortune is to be divided, one-fourth going to the protector and one to the girl.

**Apparent Joker Revealed.**  
So far the plan is entirely agreeable with the local man, but there seems to be a further stipulation that the "good chaplain" be provided with funds sufficient to redeem the luggage, in which is concealed the drafts and also to pay the passage of the girl and the chaplain from Madrid to Pendleton. There is small possibility that the money will be produced.
