Fierce Battle Today.

PERA, Sept. 2.—Culmination of the border acrays between the Turkish troops and the Montenegrins occurred today near Cusina, a Turkish city, where a pitched battle was fought according to dispatches received here. Heavy losses on both sides, and among the wounded were five Turkish women the wives of prominent generals. Women were captured by the Montenegrins. Reinforcements were hurried by both sides, and a larger clash is predicted.
