TO DEDICATE EATON HALL

BIG CELEBRATION AT SALEM ON
SEPTEMBER 21ST.

Building Donated By Union Capitalists
Will Be Dedicated.

Considerable interest to the people of La Grande is included in the appended dispatch from Salem in regard to the hall donated to the Willamette University by "Abe" Eaton of Union.

"The University of Oregon will open for its 65th consecutive year on Sep. 21st, and the prospect at present is exceedingly bright for the record freshmen class in the history of this pioneer institution of learning, in the west. Students from all parts of the Northwest have signified their intention of attending Willamette this year. Among the students coming from Portland is the honor graduate of that school.

"Since the new liberal arts building has been completed there have been several changes made in the old building. The library is being removed to the new building and the chemistry department moved up to the upper floor, while the Websterian Literary Society which occupied rooms on the tire top boor of the old liberal arts merly occupied by the library. The entire top floor of the old liberal arts building will be given over to a dormitory for the use of the students. Preparations are being made at Lausanne Hall, the girl's dormitory, for the reception of the students when school opens.

Eaton Hall, according to the plans that are now under way, will be dedicated on September 21st, the ceremonies extending over three days—Sunday, September 19th, Monday the 20th and Tuesday the 21st. It is expected that by that time the hall will be ready for use. To the dedication of this building all of the old students, alumnae and friends are cordially invited, the intention being to make the event a kind of "Old Home Week."

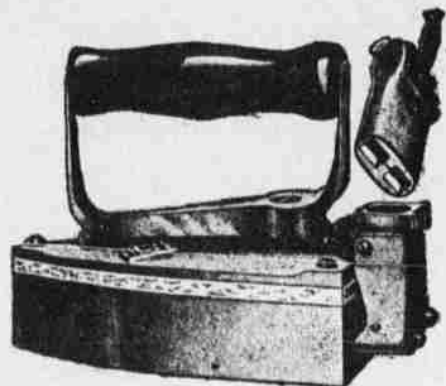
