A Hillsboro dispatch says: Hillsboro has enjoyed quite a building boom this season and building operations continue. The Tanglese two story concrete building is nearing completion while the K. & P. brick is almost ready for the roof. The large addition to the public school building is inclosed and will be ready when school open.

A number of substantial residences have been constructed and more are contemplated. The local brickyard has disposed of its output as fast as the brick was ready for delivery. The framework of both the Electric and Southern Pacific depots is up and the building nearly inclosed.

The county court has invited bids for putting in cement walks on two sides of the court house block, and cement walks are also being laid in front of several blocks of business property.
