## DITCH INTAKE SELECTED AT DIRECTORS MEETING

Definite action as to the intake of the south ditch was decided last evening at a meeting of the board of directors of the Meadowbrook Irrigation company. The 18-foot canal will start just down the stream from the Henry Young residence, at a point that is opposite the Stoddard fruit ranch. This is one of the many recommended intakes, and but is the one recommended above all by the engineer in charge, and the directors will follow this route, provided right of way can be secured at reasonable price. Not the least obstacle is feared in this respect, and even now members are out securing these rights of way. Secretary Reynolds and C. H. Conkey went out this afternoon to follow out the line of the dig canal and secure as many of the right of way titles as possible.

The action of the committee last night is one of the important ones, dealing with the speedy commencement of ditch digging. It has been impossible to advertise for bids until the definite route was decided upon, but now that this is done, matters can be hurried.

From the Henry Young place, the ditch will run east until it strikes the narrow lane coming out from May Park. It will then run south, going under the Elgin tracks by the viaduct plan and running on south until the McAulister Lane is reached. Thus far the route has been definitely decided upon. One or two other proposed routes lead out from there and when the time comes these various routes will be acted on.

## FALLS FROM PASSENGER

JAMES O'SULLIVAN BADLY HURT LAST NIGHT.

Stepped Into Ravine Instead of on Terra Firma.

James O'Sullivan, son of Peter O'Sullivan, and who for the past month has been running on a passenger brakeman's run on the Pendleton-Huntington division, met with quite a serious and peculiar accident last

night. His train stopped near Telocaset, and James, thinking he could step to the ground from the step, let go of the hand rail and stepped down. The facts of the case were that the train was standing on a culvert, and when he stepped from the steps of the coach in the darkness, it was to fall to the bottom of the gully, a considerable distance. He was brought in to La Grande on a freight train and this morning sent on to Pendleton on No. 11. He is quite badly injured by his fall, but it is not feared that anything critical will result.
