SAME OLD STORY.

Wallowa Day to be Important Affair And Well Attended Too.

John Collier has returned from Wallowa county, where he went in the interest of the Union County Exposition, and has brought the same story which has been coming from that part of the country for some time, that the people are greatly interested in the exposition and that they are arranging to come in full force on their day. Mr. Collier, as chairman of the entertainment committee, left with the people of that county full power to arrange their own program on that day and they have signified it to be their intention to begin at once to arrange their program.

Mr. Collier also stated that while nothing definite was done about the main program, things were moving along nicely and that probably within a few days things would come to a focus. Messrs Kerr and Campbell of the O. A. C. and the U. of C., have stated that they would attend and deliver addresses if it were possible. Hon. Walter N. Pierce is slated to deliver the opening address on the first day of the exposition.

BOSTON, Sept. 14.—Hearings on the development of the Boston waterfront and the improvement of the city's transportation facilities, as outlined in the report of the Metropolitan Improvement Commission, were commenced in the State House today.

INDUSTRY AT HAINES.

Portland Firm Will Feed Cattle at O. R. & N. Station.

BAKER CITY, Sept. 13.—That the little town of Haines on the O. R. & N. is to become the center of an important industry that will give it a reputation all over the northwest, has recently become known on good authority.

The firm of Swartzchild and Sulzberger of Portland has decided upon this locality to feed their winter stock and will ship thousands of head of cattle into Haines to be fed there. Toney brothers are acting as their local agents and have secured every available pasture in the vicinity of Haines.

This big packing firm has entered the cattle region of Southern Idaho and purchased thousands of range steers. Those that are ready for market are being shipped direct to Portland to the large packing plants, and the rest of the stock will be shipped to Haines and wintered there. The large supply of hay that can be secured at Haines makes that place especially valuable for wintering stock.

Baled hay is now selling at \$14 per ton and some is reported to have sold at \$15.00 a ton.
