## PIPE FOR DITCH HERE!

High pressure pipes for the Beaver Creek project reached the city this morning and will be used on the La Grande end, though not where the very greatest pressure will be found.

The pipe is eight inches in diameter and is made in a way to insure the greatest possible amount of strength. The pipe itself is made up of a three eight-inch strips wound coil fashion, and united in the same coil manner. This makes diagonal strength, which is always more secure than circular. The car load now here is unloaded, workmen having unloaded the car this morning. The load came in 15 and 30 foot joints. A tar composition covers the steel inside and out.
