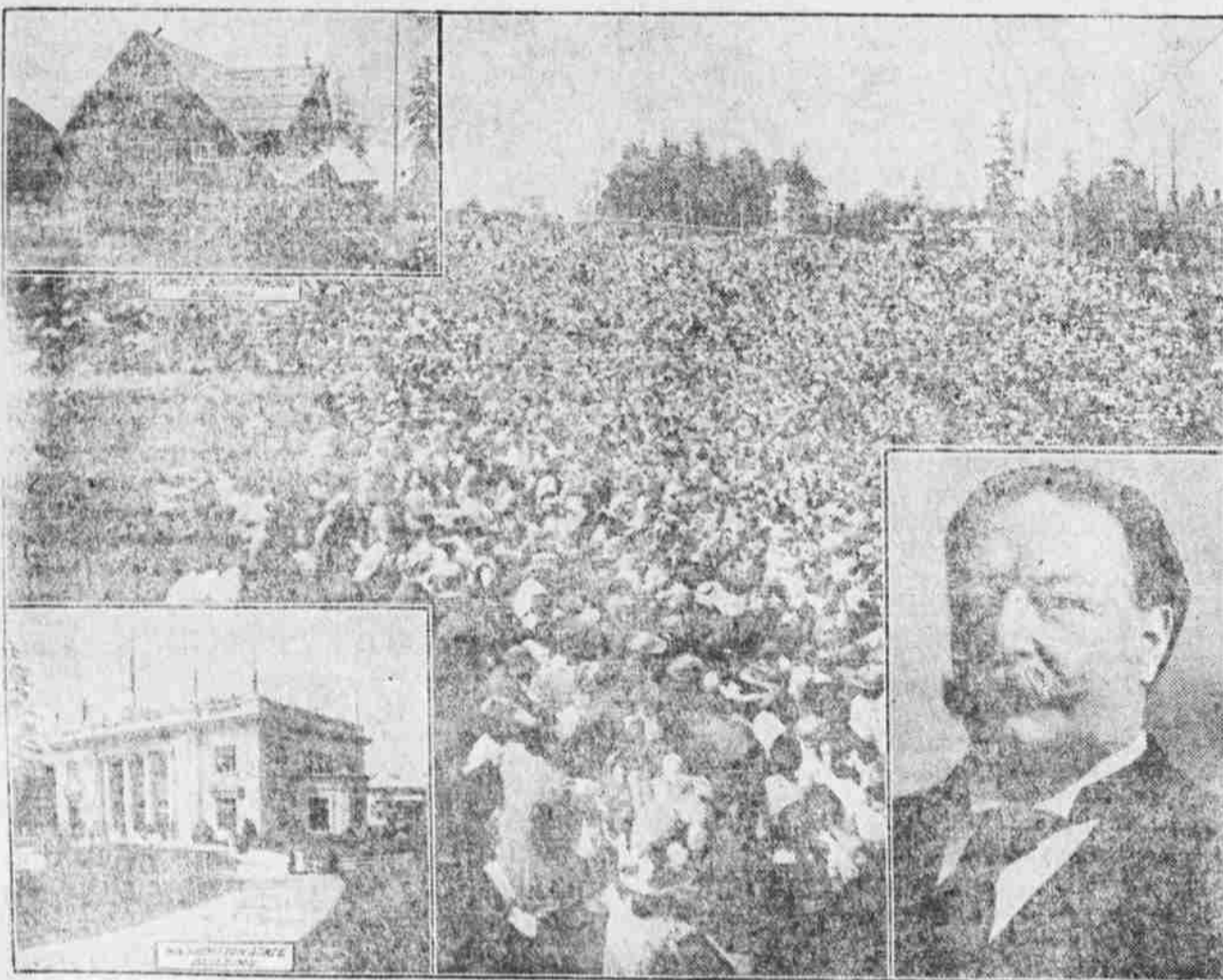

President Taft to Visit the A.-Y.-P. Exposition Sept. 29 to Oct. 1.

PRESIDENT WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT is to be the principal actor in a varied interesting program, which awaits him upon his arrival at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition in Seattle from September 29 to October 1. From the moment Bill Taft sets foot on the paved walks of the exposition he will have to hurry to keep pace with the various events in which he is scheduled to take part. His activities will have a wide range, too. And, then, the president's good nature is proverbial and his lieutenants have sent on word that the president will do his part to make the day a big success. His most formal appearance on the exposition grounds will be at a reception in the Washington state building at the official banquet. Following in line will be his initiation into the Arctic Brotherhood, the Alaska fraternal association. The president will also find time to address a monster crowd in the Natural Amphitheatre, mush down the Pay Streak, attend an elaborate luncheon, visit the United States government buildings and the Igorrote village.

September 20 at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition will be one of the president's busiest days in the west and the people will be given every opportunity to see and hear him during his visit to the fair.

MANY SLAIN IN BATTLE

GIBRALTAR, Sept. 22.—A fierce battle is raging today between the Spaniards and the Rif Tribesmen, according to advices that has just been received here. The tribesmen were defeated in the battle that was fought yesterday and retreated. This morning they reformed and renewed the attack with great ferocity. The Moors are fighting against the advance of the Spaniards. The Spanish are said to be gradually forcing the Moors back but the slaughter has been terrific and the country is littered strewn with the dead. There are 40,000 Spanish and about 50,000 Moors in the battle line and today the fight is raging in the blazing sun. The wounded are being dispatched immediately as an act of mercy as there is no way to get water nor relief to them. There are no details of the losses except it is reported that the Spanish have lost about twenty of their officers.

POST MASTERS MEET.

Twenty-five Per Cent of All Postmasters in Attendance First Day.

PORTLAND, Sept. 22.—Postmasters of Oregon opened the second annual convention here today. Needs of various offices throughout the state will be announced, and plans for betterment of service discussed.

Postmaster General Hitchcock will speak tomorrow on "Economics," and the procedure he wishes followed in postal work in this state.

Twenty-five per cent of the postmasters are present today and more are coming tonight.

Postmaster G. M. Richey of this city is in attendance.

New Forest Fires.

CHICO, Calif., Sept. 22.—Trains are stalled and mills and logging camps are closed in this vicinity, while the men are fighting a forest fire near Stirling City. Another fire is burning on the Diamond Match company property. Hundreds of men have been fighting the flames all night.

Robert Hoe Dead.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Robert H. Hoe of printing press fame, died here suddenly today. He was born in 1839 and was one of the founders of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. He was an American and his home was New York.
