OMISSION IN TWO WORDS.

Three Million And a Quarter is Real O. R. & N. Assessment.

Through the omission of two words the assessment of the O. R. & N. company in Union county was given yesterday as one quarter million dollars. The assessment of the property of the railroad company was slightly in advance of three and a quarter millions. The exact figures were \$3,273,075. On the main line the road bed was assessed at \$37,000 and the rolling stock at \$3,000. On the Elgin branch the road bed was assessed at \$33,000, and the rolling stock at \$2,000 per mile.
