SEVEN LAND DECISIONS

In addition to the famous Bean case a decision promulgated by Register Bramwell and Receiver Eberhard of the local land office, yesterday gave out a number of important decisions, involving entries either attacked by the government agents or private parties. Among these cases are the following:

U. S. vs. Milton S. Turnbull, a Baker county case, in which the decision was in favor of the defendant.

Frank C. Cropper vs. Joe P. Montag, a Baker county case, held for dismissal.

U. S. vs. J. W. Hardisty, Long Creek entry cancelled, residence not maintained.

Alono Reed vs. the heirs of Margaret Abramsick, Heppner, entry cancelled, heirs had abandoned claim taken up by the deceased.

U. S. vs. Gertrude L. Bunch, Baker county case, dismissed, alleged that the entrywoman had made false proof and had land for irrigation which could not be irrigated.

U. S. vs. Mary C. Peterson, Ritter, entry cancelled, land more valuable for agriculture than timber or stone.

U. S. vs. C. E. Young, Enterprise, case dismissed, alleged that residence had not been established.
