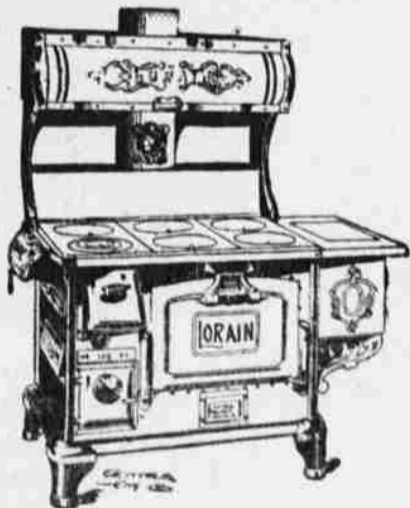

STRIKE SNAG ONCE MORE

More snags in the way of refusals of property owners along the line of the proposed South ditch for the irrigation project to turn their land over for rights of way at equitable prices, last evening "bumped" speedy for advertisements for bids for construction of the South ditch and laterals. The proposed meeting of land owners with the directors took place as scheduled, but only one or two of the land owners in question came to agreements with the directors. The others are holding out for prices which the directors will not pay, deeming them inequitable, and as a result it is more than likely that condemnation proceedings will be instituted during the coming term of the circuit court.

The directors had hoped to come to amicable settlements with all the men who own land near the ditch line and secure the necessary rights of way, that bids might be advertised for at once. Now the matter has been delayed until next Tuesday at any rate, when another meeting is to be held. The directors are tenacious and patient, however, and are worming through and around every obstacle that has yet presented itself to speedy commencement of work, and will of

course get around the present snags and obstructions.

ELECT NORTH SIDE TEACHER

MRS. CALVIN THOMASON CHOSEN LAST EVENING.

General Re-Arrangement of Classes And Students as Well.

At a meeting of the school board of La Grande held in the office of Clerk Arthur C. Williams last evening, Mrs. Calvin Thomason of the city, was elected to teach in the street school building this year. The extra teacher was found to be necessary owing to the great increase in the number of children in the north side schools. It was found after the term opened that the lower grades were crowded beyond the ability of the regular teachers to manage a portion of three of the lower grades will be taken to the smaller building and placed under the charge of the new teacher.

The same crowded condition of the lower grades, especially the fourth grade, was found to exist earlier in the year at the White school, but this was adjusted by giving the teachers in some of the higher grades a portion of the flock of the fourth grade teacher.
