ATKINSON NOT GUILTY

After deliberating two hours the jury in the Atkinson case returned a verdict of not guilty this afternoon. Unquestionably the point which freed the defendant was the uncertainty of what is near beer. Some of the witnesses swore the drink given out by Atkinson was cream soda and some that it was near beer. In either case the charge of selling near beer without a license would not hold. "On again, off again, Atkinson," is the motto in the circuit court room this week. With the case of the city of La Grande vs. Atkinson, in which the issue was selling near beer without a license, finished the case of the city of La Grande vs. Atkinson, in which he is charged with selling whisky in violation of the local option law, will be taken up. The jury is still deliberating in the first case.

In the second trial the issue from the point of view of law will be whether or not the city has a right under the state local option law to punish a man for selling intoxicating liquor. It is argued that the law provided for the punishment of violators of the law through district attorneys and the state court officials.

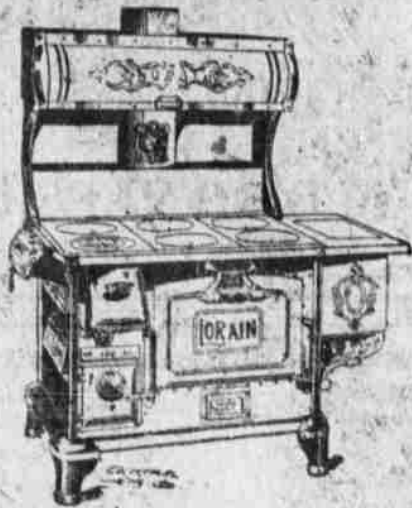
