Walter Pierce in his address Monday evening touched upon a very important phase of our commercial life as it exists today and that is for a closer union of sympathy between the farmers of this county and the merchants. That there is seemingly an imaginary wall between them, but in reality it does not exist. Their interests are mutual. Mr. Pierce's suggestion if carried out will bring them together and both will profit thereby. The farmers are sending out for thousands of dollars worth of goods which should be purchased of our home merchants and would be if there was a little different feeling and understanding. The Farmers' Union can bring this about by working in conjunction with the Merchants' Union or rather, the Merchants' Protective association. The farmers have been led to believe that the purposes of this organization was to fix and agree upon a uniform schedule of prices.

This is an erroneous idea, the purpose of this organization is purely a matter of credits, and not a single meeting have prices ever been discussed and it is no part of the object of the association. This matter can easily be vouched for by any one who cares to investigate. About 60 business men belong to the Protective association of this city and an affidavit if necessary could be secured from each and every member thereof to the effect that prices at any meeting were discussed and further would not be permitted to be discussed. But if some delinquent debtor was found to be owing a number of the merchants, steps would be discussed to see if he could not be made to pay.
