The major has been working on the present collection for 20 years and has articles that are invaluable. Everything that Indians can use in the way of wearing apparel is to be found. Squaw bonnets with Hudson bay beads not sold for the past 50 years, war bonnets and the full list of Indian regalia are in the collection.

Stories of scalping parties are ruined by the sight of the scalp of a Cheyenne chief, which was taken by an old plainsman. A costly suit belonging to the nephew of Old Sitting Bull, is also historically suggestive.

A copy of the "Journal" published in La Grande, December 2, 1889, is on exhibit and says of the major:

"Lee Moorehouse, agent on the Umatilla reservation, came through this city on his way to Washington, D. C., with Chief Peo Homi, and Show-away, Young Chief, and Wolfe. They expect to see the Great White Father and get their wrongs righted."
