KING ROWE IS ON TRIAL

The circuit court was occupied today with the trial of King Rowe, who is charged with assaulting Claire Crossen with a dangerous weapon. alleged crime was committed at a dance on the J. E. Campbell farm a couple of miles east of town last spring when a dance was in progress. In the "cold gray dawn of the morning after," Young Crossen woke up with a mighty sore head. He had a gash about two inches long cut to the skull bone just above his left ear. How it got there is the issue in the case. Crossen and his friends declare that Rowe hit him with a pistol, but Young Rowe's friends say that he had no pistol but hit Crossen with his fist and knocked him down upon some scales and that it was in the fall that the gash was cut. The case has attracted more people to the court room than any other that has been on this term. Both of the young men are well known in the valley and each have a wide circle of friends interested in the outcome of the trial.
