## WILL STORE LUMBER AND BUILD AGAIN NEXT YEAR

That the lumber out of which the exposition buildings were constructed is not to be sold, but stored to be used next year was the decision of the executive board after an extended meeting in the Commercial Club rooms last night. A number of attractive offers were received but it was considered best to keep the lumber for rebuilding. It is probable that the same location will be used again.

Another matter of importance to the people who participated in the exposition was the fact brought out regarding the payment of the premiums. It will probably be 30 or 40 days before the state pays any of the premiums although when the payments do come they will be practically 100 cents on the dollar.

The exposition has nothing to do with the payment of any premiums excepting some special prizes. The state appropriated the money for the premium purposes and consequently the bills must all be audited and sent to the secretary of state for returns.

It was found after settling up all the business connected with the exposition that the financial showing made was excellent, considering the fact that the enterprise was a new one and that the people had to be shown. The rainy Wednesday was also a detriment. In spite of these things the outcome was good and a large amount of valuable property in the way of lumber and ten's is left in the possession of the executive board.
