**GREEK KILLED.**

Quarreled With Greek Over Purchase Of Whisky and Then Killed Him.

Baker City, Oct. 14.—Hugh Jackson is in jail at Prairie City today for the killing of a Greek a few miles out of Austin last night on the extension of the Sumpter Valley railroad, which is now under construction.

Jackson and the Greek were in a tent with the other men and all of them were drinking. Jackson demanded that the Greek put up another dollar with which to buy whiskey, which the Greek refused to do. A quarrel followed and Jackson was ejected from the tent. He armed himself with a gun and returned. But the Greek saw him first and made for him with a club. Jackson aimed his gun at the Greek and fired the bullet passing through the foreigners breast and death followed instantly. The murderer gave himself up to the officers and he was taken to Prairie City and lodged in jail. He was a driver for Charles Cok. The crime occurred in Grant county. It was later learned that the name of the Greek was Nick Jim.

**New Light on Civil War.**

New York, Oct. 15.—New light is thrown on the causes of the late unpleasantness between the North and the South by a book issued today by a prominent New York and London publishing house. It is entitled "Virginia's Attitude Toward Slavery and Secession" and contains much matter never before given publicity. The author, Beverly B. Munford is a prominent member of the Virginia bar and closely identified with the political, educational and social life of the state.

In this work Mr. Munford has endeavored to present the anti-slavery and Union loving sentiments of Virginia, and to show how neither devotion to slavery nor hostility to the Union was the controlling cause which impelled her to separation. The work presents a comprehensive review of Virginia's record with respect to slavery, and the difficulties, legal, ethical and racial which embarrassed emancipation.

The author has fortified his work by a mass of data, heretofore unpublished. Critics who have access to the advance sheets, pronounce the work as a most valuable contribution to the historical literature of the time.

## ROWE FINED ONE HUNDRED

POSSIBLE PRISON SENTENCE IS LEFT OFF PUNISHMENT.

Attorney Finn Pleads for Young Lad Prior to Sentence Hour.

When King Rowe was brought up for sentence this morning, his attorney, C. H. Finn made a plea in his behalf, stating that the evidence was meager and that the boy had not been convicted of the crime charged against him. He also said that the boy was industrious and just starting out in life. For these reasons he said that he considered the court justified in even paroling him. Judge Knowles, however said that from the verdict and the evidence in the case he felt that it was his duty to impress a fine

of \$100. A term in prison would have been a possible sentence under the verdict.
