"Corianton."

All the greatest of all religious dramas, the famous Mormon play, "Corianton," will be the bill at the Steward theatre, Thursday night. The mere announcement of this play will be revived should fill the theatre at every performance. When the play was first produced seven years ago

the press and public declared that it was one of the most magnificent productions ever seen in this country. Later it was taken east and still later brought back to the large cities of the Pacific coast. In every case the verdict was the same.

LA GRANDE STILL CONTINUES TO HOLD IMPORTANT OFFICES

Local Club Women Honored With Next to Highest Office.

The report of the resolution committee adopted declares:

"That all of the federated clubs work for an art commission in their respective towns.

"That the federation recommend the state university program for use in the clubs in place of magazine programs.

"That President Taft do uphold the Roosevelt-Bonaparte decision.

"That the federation work for the protection of children from impure milk in Oregon.

"That a report be sent by each club to the educational department of the condition of the schools, in accordance with the suggestion of State Superintendent of Schools Askerman.

Texas Mothers Organize.
Dallas, Oct. 18—Possibly in the belief that President Taft shares the views of his predecessor on race suicide and allied topics, the mothers of the Lone Star State have selected a date coincident with the chief executive's visit to the state to organize a Texas Mothers' Congress. The session was commenced today and will occupy three days which diet for infants, teething, soothing syrup and other important subjects will be threshed out.
