## MUCH DONE AT MEETING

CO. NICHOLMAN BOLTON RESIGNS  
HIS POSITION.

Lights, Special Election and Other  
Things Touched Upon.

When the proposition of refunding the bond issue of 1934 came up last night at the council meeting, reports concerning the sale of the city bonds were so favorable that it was suggested that the 1912 bonds be refunded at the same time. The meeting adjourned to meet again next Wednesday when an ordinance providing for the calling of a special election will be prepared. It is probable that the whole \$50,000 bond issue will be submitted at the coming special election.

Mayor Hall and Councilman Meyers and Reynolds composed a committee for the purpose of employing a competent engineer for the purpose of making a sewerage plat of the city and to thoroughly investigate the condition of the water mains and sewers along Adams and Depot streets. This is in accordance with the sentiment of a number of taxpayers who attended the meeting of the council some time ago to urge the arrangement of the sewer system before the paving was done.

It is becoming a difficult task for the people of the city to keep track of the city council, the personnel of that body is changing so continually. Last night S. N. Bolton tendered his resignation, giving as his excuse the rush of business affairs. Mayor Hall expressed regret at losing Mr. Bolton and that the representative men of the city were taking no more interest in the affairs of the city.

The council was again flooded with petitions for more arc lights in various places in the city. This seems to be one of the most difficult questions confronting the city at the present time. These petitions were referred to the street committee with instructions to the committee to reorganize and get busy. Mayor said there had not been a report from the street committee for four months and the interests of the city were being neglected.

## BUCKLEY LOSES SUM

GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT IS  
ROBBED OF VALUABLES.

News Leaked Out Yesterday That  
Gen. Supt. Was Touched.

Though it only leaked out in Portland yesterday, General Superintendent M. J. Buckley who spent two days in La Grande this week, was robbed of a considerable sum and valuables last Sunday night. The Portland Telegram relates:

M. J. Buckley, general superintendent of the Harriman lines in the North west, was robbed of between \$600 and \$700 in cash, a draft for \$1,000 and a package of personal passes on almost every railroad in the country besides a number of other valuable papers while on a dining car of the O. R. & N. passenger train which left Portland Sunday night.

Great efforts have been made to keep the "touch" a secret until the railroad, Pullman and other detectives could get some tangible clue to work on. Further than that Mr. Buckley had "lost his pocketbook" no information is to be had at the local Harriman offices.

The facts regarding the bold robbery, as near as can be learned, are these: Mr. Buckley was called out on the line last Sunday and he left for the east on No. 6, the Oregon and Washington limited, which leaves at 5:45 p. m. He had his wallet with the money and draft on an inside pocket, and after eating his dinner in the diner early in the evening, he paid his check and replaced his wallet in

his pocket. Just how and in what circumstance the robbery occurred is not known, but it is supposed to have happened somewhere near The Dalles.

The reports made by Mr. Buckley to the secret service men are to the effect that when he left the train at his destination in Eastern Oregon he felt for the pocket book only to find it missing. The trainmen on No. 6 as well as the Pullman conductor were notified, Mr. Buckley at first suspecting that the wallet had dropped out of his pocket. It is understood that a thorough search of the diner and the car on which Mr. Buckley rode, was made without finding any trace of the money or valuables. This strengthens the robbery theory, for if some innocent person had found the pocketbook the identity of the owner would have been immediately established by the passes and draft.
