MARKET IS GOOD

E. S. NORRIS HOME FROM SEATTLE VISIT.

Will Have Long Report of Make to The Union Tomorrow.

E. S. Norris has returned from an extended business visit to Seattle and Portland where he made a study of the market conditions. He will make a report to the members of the farmers Union at the regular meeting of that organization tomorrow afternoon.

In speaking of conditions in the coast cities Mr. Norris said this morning that while there had been some fall in the wheat quotations during the past two days the outlook is encouraging. He said that the tone of the market was strong owing to extensive shipments from Portland both by rail and by ship. Mr. Norris says that while he looks for no phenomenal advances in the price of wheat, he has no fears for the farmers in having more on hands than they can dispose of at a good figure.

In regard to the amount of grain being held by the farmers of the Grande Ronde valley, Mr. Norris says there is about 3-4 of the crop left. He says the market conditions are healthy and expresses no doubt but that a good price will be obtained.

Late Mrs. Morris Known Here.

Mrs. Hanna Rodney Morris is the widow of Bishop B. Wister Morris, died yesterday morning at 10 o'clock as the result of a stroke of paralysis suffered by her on Sunday night. The funeral has been postponed until after Sunday awaiting the arrival of her son, B. Wister Morris of New York, who will arrive Sunday morning. The funeral will probably be Monday morning from the house, says the Portland Journal.—Mrs. Morris was well known here, where she had many warm, personal friends.

STUDENTS GET REDUCTION. Lecture Course Handed Out to Students for a Lower Rate.

LOGS ADVANCING.

The demand for logs is largely confined to red fir, on account of the strong demand for railroad material. As a consequence white logs are scarce and some camps have advanced the prices from \$7.50 to \$8. There is an abundance of yellow fir logs on hand; they are bringing \$9 to \$10. The camps are all running full blast and will continue till the season breaks.—The Timberman.

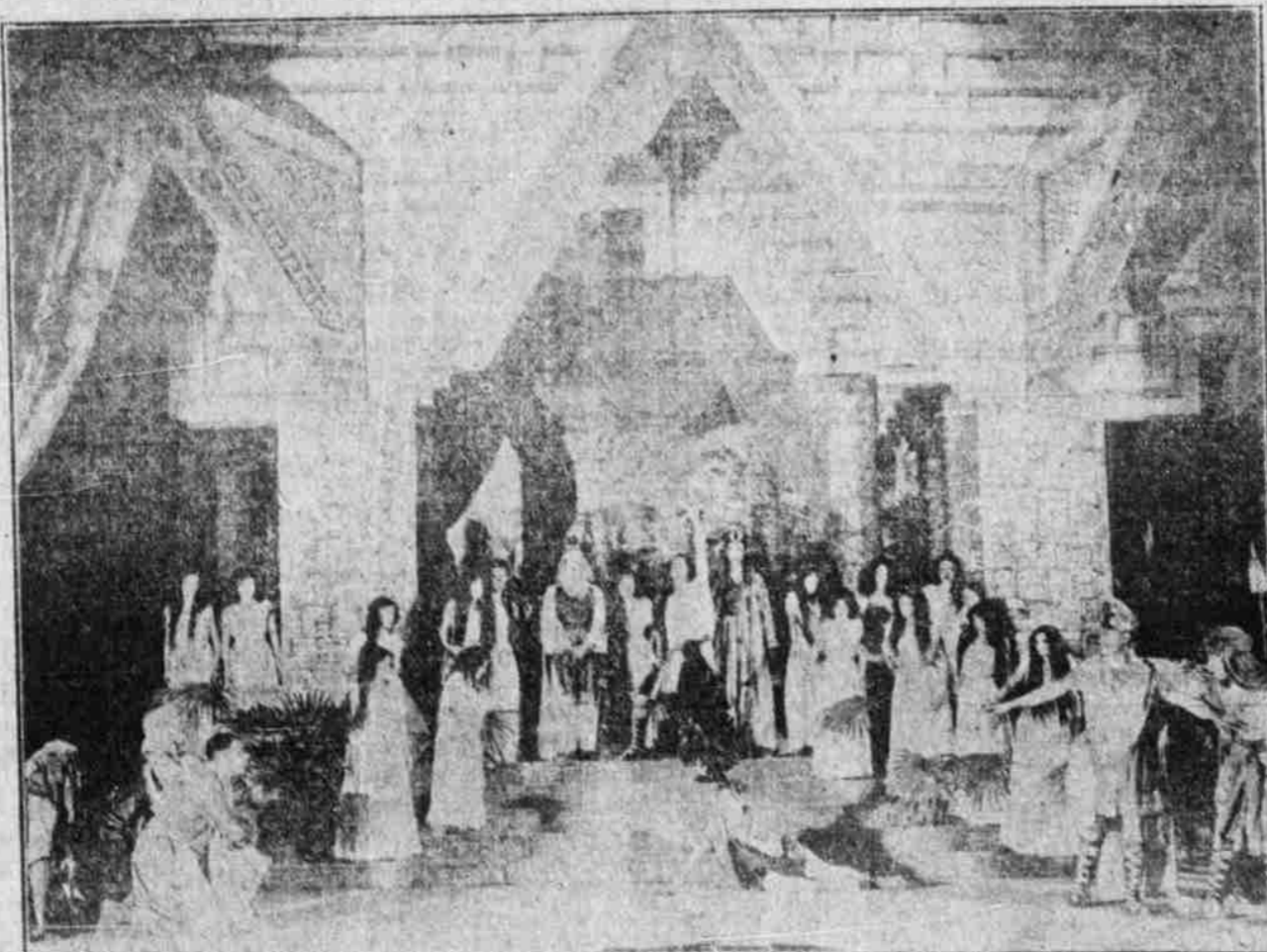
