MEETING OF THE PRESIDENTS.

The Portland Telegram, in a recent issue publishes the following editorial in regard to the meeting of President Taft and President Diaz at El Paso recently, under the caption of: "The Touch of Barbaric Childishness."

There was a meeting of the two Presidents. Two republican rulers met, clasped hands and exchanged the compliments of the occasion. They did this not once, but twice. A neutral zone was duly and officially designated, at one border of which President Taft received President Diaz upon the first formal call; and at the other President Diaz received President Taft when that formal call was as formally returned. There were accompanying escorts, back and forth, of dignitaries, of troops of cavalry and of batteries of artillery. There was pomp and pageantry which maintained the spirit of barbaric display which, upon the meeting of Emperors in the middle ages, was considered essential to the dignity of those who ruled, and as awe-inspiring to those who were ruled.

It is not entirely unwarranted captiousness to refer to this meeting in this strain, for the reasons that the governments represented by the principals in this august event are of the democratic form which assumes simplicity. The purpose of that meeting at El Paso, if it had any purpose worth the while, was an international exchange of felicitation and good wishes. That purpose would have been more sensibly consummated, if, in the center of that neutral zone, both Presidents would have met before such a mixed audience of Americans and Mexicans as chose to gather there, and with as little ostentation and formality as the circumstance would permit. If each President had addressed the other one publicly to the mutual good feeling of all concerned, there would have been an actual and sensible interchange of courtesies of real international import. It would have been an act in which there would have been popular participation—something we might reasonably expect, where one popular government said to the other, "I'm glad to shake you by the hand," and the other popular government replied in kind.

What the Presidents said to each other, either on the first or the second call, is not known and in all probabilities would not appeal to us if it were known. They might have said: "It is a fine day," or "the pleasure is all mine," or indulged in any one or any number of the common platitudes which the atmosphere of formal courtesy which prevailed suggested. But speculation as to what was said is thrust into the background by the trimmings of the occasion, which were copied from barbarism. As the meeting was conducted, it suggests the pity that we have not advanced so far in democracy as to dismiss this childish display, that we have not evolved to the worth and dignity of simplicity.

It will require no seer to predict that in time Union county will be one of the largest fruit producing sections in the Northwest. Within a few years it is interesting to note the development of the different sections of the country. Twenty five years ago the only spot in the valley where fruit was absolutely sure was in Cove. About fifteen years ago, a few with trembling and fear set out small commercial orchards in Fruitdale and May Park, adjacent to La Grande. The success of this enterprise is now

reflected in the car loads of fruit shipped annually. The Sandridge was the next section of the valley that was held back for years because no one made the attempt. Now this section is recognized as a fruit belt that real estate men and growers will demonstrate to their satisfaction, and their arguments will be quite convincing that the Sandridge is "It." Later, the North end of the county went into the fruit business and the hundreds who visited the Elgin apple show last week notwithstanding they were from "Missouri" were shown, alright.

While we have commercial orchards in pears and cherries there is little question but what the winter apple will be king in Union county. We grow this to perfection and our apples being exceptional keepers, growers and dealers have from four to five months in which to market them.

We think we are engaged quite extensively in the fruit business today, but twenty years hence we will look back upon this period as our experimental stage. Union county will be sending fruits to the eastern markets and across the Pacific in train load lots in a few years.

There was a disappointed crowd of High school football folks as a result of the football game Saturday. But they must remember that it is as much the part of a complete education to be a good loser as it is a winner, and this accident happens under almost every condition of life. It was simply an accident that La Grande lost the game Saturday, but it cannot be helped. There are other victories to win.
