THE HOUSE OF GOOD CLOTHES

Cold Shoulders for Suffragettes.

New York, Oct. 25.—Hundreds of working women ranging from college professors and artists to cooks and waitresses, will gather at Carnegie Hall tonight to give a glorious greeting to Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader and founder of the strenuous suffragette movement in England. The militant leader of the British forces will not have the countenance of the society suffragettes of New York. Mrs. Clarence Mackay, president of the Equal Suffrage Society, has declined to appear at the meeting or introduce Mrs. Pankhurst.

Tonight's meeting will serve as a celebration in commemoration of the anniversary of Mrs. Pankhurst founding of the modern suffragette movement in London on Oct. 25, 1904.

Mrs. Pankhurst is now under suspended sentence of the English court, having been placed under arrest in June of this year for leading a suffragette delegation to the House of Commons to interview the Prime Minister.

Mrs. Mackay's aloofness has only slightly dampened the ardor of the occasion. The cause for her actions are two-fold. First, to use her own words, that the reason for suffrage is a community of interest between the two sexes—not a fight for rights but a logical evolution of justice. And second that American manhood has always treated American womanhood in such a way as to make us feel that we will ultimately achieve our aim without sensationalism.

While the English militant and their American prototypes are disclaimed by many among the conservative suffragists, the Equal Franchise Society will be practically the only logical organization unrepresented officially at the Pankhurst meeting, and individual members of it will be present. The refusal of Mrs. Mackay to make any compromise is unique. She will give no countenance direct or indirect, to the infraction of law and order. It also developed yesterday that the Equal Franchise Society alone will take no part in the local campaign by endorsing Mr. Hearst or any other friend of equal rights.

"I will not indorse the militant methods," said Mrs. Mackay. "The purpose of our society is to promote the welfare of women by securing the National, State and local electoral franchise for women because we believe in the political and civil equality of men and women."

To secure it Mrs. Mackay said it was not necessary to imitate the methods used in other countries.

"It has been repeatedly said to me by men in public and private life," she went on, "that when the women of the United States unite in demanding the vote they will get it. And I think that it is perfectly true. What is needed to further the suffrage cause is to give all sorts of women the opportunity of listening to speakers who will explain what it means to all."

In Mrs. Mackay's society there is a number of men and she in no wise presupposes or admits antagonism in the other sex.

"Most of the men I have met are apparently willing to co-operate with us and have listened to what we have to say with courtesy and consideration."

"It has not seemed necessary in the past and I don't think that it will be necessary in the future for us to go out to the street corners and shriek our propaganda at the passers-by. We have but to plead our cause, without raising our voices to the men and women who are not with us. The strongest suffragists throughout the country are those women who devote their energies toward the developing of their children to make them citizens worthy of our great country."

Examinations for Foresters.

Washington, Oct. 25.—An examination to fill vacancies in the ranger force on one hundred and forty-nine national forests in twenty-one states and territories, including Alaska, will be held today and tomorrow. From this examination it is expected that 500 appointments will be made. This examination will be held in each forest Supervisor's headquarters in the national forest states and territories, including Arkansas, Minnesota, Michigan and Florida, which are the most easterly states having national forests.

While the examination is entirely along practical lines, and knowledge of field conditions rather than book-learning is considered essential, the opportunities for those applicants with educational advantages are considerably increased.
