## TEXAS OUSTS 4 COMPANIES

STANDARD OIL CONCERNS ARE GIVEN JOLT.

High Court Throws Oil Octopus Out Of State Perpetually.

Austin, Oct. 26.—The Texas district court today issued a decree ousting four branches of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey from doing business in the state of Texas. The companies are the Security Oil Company; Navarre Refining Company; and the Union Tank and Standard Oil Companies of Indiana.

All four companies are perpetually enjoined from doing business in the state of Texas. The court ordered all of their property to be sold and in addition ordered that their property be placed in the hands of receivers prior to a public sale.

### Reduced Railway Rates.

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 26.—A 2 1-2 cent fare was inaugurated today on the Norfolk & Southern in this state instead of the 3 cent fare heretofore prevailing. This makes the reduced rate apply to all the principal railroads operating in the state which are the Seaboard Air Line, the Southern, the Norfolk & Southern and the Atlantic Coast Line.
