TAMMANY GIVEN STINGING WHACK

MAYORALTY ONLY IS TAMMANY A VICTOR.

Here Fact Murphy's Man is a Tammany Member Does not Give Murphy and His Crowd Full Sway—Committee of Estimates, Controlling a Bill—Fusion—Gaynor Himself Really "Reform."

New York, Nov. 3.—Revised returns this afternoon show the following totals: Gaynor, 250,678; Bannard, 177,662; Hearst, 153,843.

New York, Oct. 3.—The domination of Tammany Hall by Charles Murphy and Daniel Cohalen is believed to be at an end following the rout of Tammany at the election here yesterday, excepting of course, Gaynor for mayor.

Personally, Murphy and Cohalen are detested, but Murphy was forced into the nomination on account of his popularity. It is believed, as it was thought his personal popularity would succeed in electing the entire ticket.

Charles W. Whitman, a fusionist, has been elected as the successor of Jerome, over George Gordon Battle. The full extent of the defeat is shown by the fact that the board of estimates which control a billion dollars a year in the way of expenditures, will stand as follows: Fusion, 13 votes, Tammany 2.

Gaynor a Reform Man. Gaynor was known for years as a reformer and little of his past record

ROCKEFELLER NO POLITICIAN

HIS ADVENT AGAINST LIQUOR IS DISMAL FAILURE.

His Gift of Several Thousand to Anti-booze Club Falls.

New York, Nov. 3.—Rockefeller's advent into the political arena at Greensburg and Mount Pleasant townships, today resulted in a stinging defeat.

Despite the fact that the magnate was identified several days ago as being on the side of the drys in the election that was held yesterday, both of the counties were voted wet by a comfortable majority.

Rockefeller joined the dry campaign after the liquor interests had a meeting at Tarrytown and denounced his giving through his daughter, Mrs. McCormick, \$335,000 to the Anti-Saloon League. Rockefeller refused to discuss the matter.

can offer any satisfaction to Murphy. Though Gaynor was bitterly attacked in the campaign by Hearst and Bannard men, they directed most of their shafts against the tickets rather than against Gaynor personally.

Another defeat which Murphy scored was the election of McAneny who for several years has been the president of the City Club and is now the president of the board of aldermen for the borough of Manhattan, defeating McHugh the Tammany candidate and also Cyrus Miller the fusion candidate.

Tacoma, Nov. 3.—Reports show that Judge McCredie the Portland baseball magnate, for congress, carried every country district except Pierce, with big majorities. McCredie is to succeed W. K. Cushman, deceased.

UNION LABOR IS KING IN 'FRISCO

SUPERVISORS BOARD WILL BE MAJORITY LABORMEN.

McCarthy, the New Mayor, Says that He Will Vindicate Union Labor by Starting His Reign Honestly and Avoid any Repetition of the Schmitz-Ruef Regime—Votes Counted Slowly, but Heney is Easily Defeated for District Attorney.

San Francisco, Nov. 3.—The count of the vote cast at yesterday's election is progressing slowly. It is now estimated that H. H. McCarthy, the Union Labor candidate for mayor, has been elected by about 8,000 plurality. Fickert will win over Heney for district attorney by fully 10,000. The board of supervisors will probably stand Union Labor, ten; republicans, 5; democrats 3.

Will Vindicate Labor. At noon today less than half the votes were counted. There is no doubt however but that the city will go for the Union Labor candidates for mayor and a majority of the board of supervisors. McCarthy, the successful candidate stated today that the new regime would start free handed and that the returns of the Labor vote would give him a chance to vindicate organized labor under when Schmitz and Ruef conducted the ill famed regime.

SET PRISONERS TO ROAD WORK

OCCUPANTS OF COUNTY JAIL WILL HAVE TO DO LABOR.

Booth Lane to Have Prisoners of County Jail—Steps Taken to Enforce Order and Prevent Escapes—Three Men Eligible for the "Honor"—Rail and Chain will be Held as Cudgel—Can reduce Actual Jail Time This Way.

The county court today issued the order authorizing Superintendent Campbell to take charge of the three prisoners in the county jail. Ralph Atkinson, Billy Donaldson and Millard Nelson and put them to work on Booth lane. These men will be assigned to the rock crusher where they will be given an opportunity to work their way out of jail a little more rapidly and at the same time boost the county by earning their board and keep.

The suggestion was made this morning that it might be necessary to charter the ball and chain. If any attempt to escape is made, the clankers will be brought into service. In order that the men may not set a bad example to others by lagging at their work the rule will probably be enforced as in Multnomah county—work and eat or lag and subsist on bread and water. Two of the men are alleged liquor dealers.

Aside from this there was but little of interest in the first days deliberations in the county court. There is no road petitions and but little on the docket outside of the regular monthly bills.

BLOOD SPILLING IS EVIDENT IN SPOKANE.

Spokane, Nov. 3.—The arrival of Eugene Debs is expected this afternoon for the purpose of assisting the Industrial Workers of the World or socialists, in their revolt against the ordinance of Spokane prohibiting all street speaking. There are said to be a hundred men on their way from Portland, Missoula, Kallispell and other places. The assistance of the militia will likely become necessary in order to enable the police to cope with the situation. The jail is already overcrowded as twenty arrests have been made today. It is predicted in some quarters that bloodshed will result if the courts do not repeal the ordinance.

Agents for the Census. Washington, Nov. 3.—By order of Census Bureau Director Durand, examinations are being held throughout the United States today for special agents for the census. The applicant in today's test have no connection with the census enumerators. The duties of the special agents will be to collect statistics for the next census of manufacturers, mines and quarries. As far as possible, it is desired to obtain persons who have college or university courses in statistics or economics, or persons who have had experience in the accounting department of manufacturing or other business establishments.

ON DESCHUTES ROAD NOW

ENGINEER BRANDON MEETS OLD TIME FRIENDS HERE.

Well Known Engineer Has Big Contract Under Way up Deschutes.

Assistant Chief Engineer H. C. Brandon, who built the Joseph extension, later going to Riparia and now at the head of the Harriman construction in the Deschutes canyon, was in the city for a few minutes this morning, on his way to Wallawa to attend a hearing there which has attracted several lawyers from here relative to a right of way matter. Mr. Brandon is the same general individual and though weighed down with oceans of work, found time to shake hands with many of his old friends.

He reports that the Harriman line has been built 110 miles up the canyon, far in advance of the opposition line, that over 500 horses and 2,000 men are employed. Mr. Brandon was called from Riparia to the Deschutes work, but still has the former contract under his supervision.

FRENCH WOMEN CHARGE POLICE

FRIGHTFUL STRUGGLE TO SEE TRIAL.

Trial of Famous Murderess Starts Wild Riot.

Paris, Oct. 3.—Twenty-three thousand people surrounded the Palais de Justice today clamoring for a hundred seats from which the public may witness the trial of Madame Marguerite Steinthal. The trial began at noon today. She is charged with having murdered her husband, a famous artist, and her mother-in-law.

When it was announced that no women would be admitted to the trial it almost caused a panic. The women hurled themselves at the gendarmes in their efforts to gain admission by force and the officers were compelled to use their clubs in order to restore order. A moving picture company has offered a fabulous price for the permission to photograph the proceedings.

Gives Taft the Cold Shoulder.

Columbus, Ga., Nov. 3.—Because of the fact that President Taft and his party allowed a stopover of only ten minutes here today en route from Birmingham to Macon, the city of Columbus will take no official recognition of the trip whatever. Both the City Council and the Board of Trade concur in the plan to give the President the cold shoulder. The feeling against Mr. Taft is due to the fact that, after promising to stop here several hours, he changed his plan and decided to spend only ten minutes in this city. Mayor Rhodes Brown was the leader in the opposition to the recognition of Mr. Taft. Mayor Brown said that it would be a reflection upon the city's dignity to continue to press its attentions upon the president. He said that every member of the committee that went to Washington could testify to President Taft's promise to make a visit to the city of Columbus.

OCTOBER A HEAVY MONTH.

Month Just Past Saw Big Expenditures Principally For Schools. October was a heavy month for the county treasurer. Treasurer John Frawley's report shows an expenditure of approximately \$50,000. The principal items were the schools about \$19,000, state taxes \$15,000, and the county road warrants. October is usual by the heaviest business month.

JOHNSON LOSES MAYORALTY RACE

NORMONS DEFEATED IN SALT LAKE CITY ELECTION.

Negro Disfranchisement in Baltimore Defeated—Elections Throughout the Country Bring Unusual Surprises—Albany Assembly Will Have Two Republicans Now—Republicans in the East Generally Win Easy Victory.

Cleveland, Nov. 3.—Following his defeat by Herman Bachor, republican, Mayor J. L. Johnson, the democratic nominee, has announced that he will be a candidate two years hence. The defeat of Johnson is claimed as a loss of confidence in the "Low Fare Mayor."

Toledo Mayor Independent. Toledo, Nov. 3.—Brand Whitlock, the independent candidate was elected mayor by a majority of 5,500.

McEwan Heads Albany. Albany, N. J., Nov. 3.—James McEwan, republican candidate, was elected mayor of Albany yesterday. The entire city and county ticket went republican by 5,700.

Republicans Strong in Rochester. Rochester, Nov. 3.—Entire republican ticket was elected here with a plurality of 6,500. Hiram Edgerton was elected mayor.

Democrat in Buffalo. Buffalo, Nov. 3.—Louis Fuhrman was elected mayor by the democratic vote with a plurality of 1,300. Republicans captured remainder of the city. Salt Lake, Nov. 3.—The American, which is the anti-church party, yesterday elected Mayor J. S. Bransford mayor of Salt Lake City by a substantial majority. They also elected eight of the ten councilmen.

Negro Fight Fatal.

Baltimore, Nov. 3.—The disfranchisement amendment, which was a blow aimed at the negro voters, was defeated in the general election held in this state yesterday. This makes the second time that this amendment has been defeated within the past few years.

Democrats Still Rule.

Albany, Nov. 3.—The next assembly will be composed of two republicans, forty eight democrats, which is a gain of two republicans. The senatorial feature from this will mean the defeat of State Senator John Raines, president pro tem of the senate for years and a republican leader of the house.

Rhode Island Republican.

Providence, Nov. 3.—Complete returns go to show that the republicans have won a sweeping victory in Rhode Island. Pothier has been elected governor.

Draper Re-Elected.

Boston, Nov. 3.—Eben S. Draper, was re-elected governor by a majority of less than ten thousand.

Rotan Re-Elected.

Philadelphia, Nov. 3.—Sam P. Rotan, was re-elected district attorney on the republican ticket.

Schley Again a Hero.

Wheeling, W. Va., Nov. 3.—An elaborate ceremony was held here today commemorating the completion of the McMecham dam. Admiral Winfield Scott Schley was given the place of honor in the naval parade.
