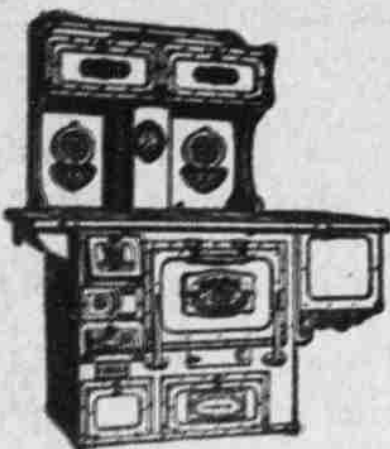

LACK OF COAL STOPS WORK

FOUR CAR LOADS HAVE LEFT POCATELLO YARDS.

Local Sugar Factory Still Unable To Operate—Ten Days Work Still For Factory to Do.

Idle for hours at a heavy expense, the Amalgamated Sugar Factory is now awaiting the arrival of coal for fuel. Thirty-six hours ago the factory was closed when the promised coal shipment failed to arrive to replenish the depleted coal bins. Since that time the wheels have been idle. Four car loads of coal have been reported out of Pocatello for some time, but it is slow in reaching here, and no report is available. Unless good hopes are shattered again, it will arrive sometime or tonight.

There are large quantities of beets in the bunkers ready for the factory, but the coal shortage prevents operation. It was thought last week that the last of the beets would be hauled to the factory by Thursday or Friday of this week, but rain or other delays have postponed the completion of the work until next week. About ten days of actual operation on the part of the factory is estimated, after the hour the factory resumes its run.

The boilers have not been allowed to cool, thus far, a condition which will be averted, if possible, due to the extreme expense of refiring again.
