OPINION ON STATUTE (Continued From Page Six)

When it is known that the real object of the law is to prevent the spreading of insect pest and diseases, this infringement of the domain of the private contract is the reason why so many people hold this kind of legislation in utter contempt. Where there is no transmission of the pest, and where the parties are agreed, and where there is no misrepresentation, where one party buys what the other party has, and no one is injured in any way, it does look to a man up a tree that we have about as many rights as a jackrabbit when both parties to deal have to sneak around like thieves in the night to do a thing they have a natural and constitutional right to do.

Now, coming back to the prohibition of the sale of infected apples as heretofore quoted from the law. It shall be unlawful to sell any infested fruit of any kind in the state of Oregon. Every person who prepares for shipment, delivers to any agent to be transported within or without the state any fresh, cured or dried fruit that is infested with insect pest is guilty of a misdemeanor. If infested means where the worms have been, then it is unlawful to ship to Walla Walla, to sell to the vinegar man, or the cider man to make apple jack, to the man who makes dried fruit, to the butcher man who feeds them to his hogs, or to any person for any purpose or no purpose whatever. The prohibition is absolute and unqualified but it seems that no objection has been made except in the case of a poor person buying the fruit for home consumption. The discrimination is made against the party buying who needs most to buy, who uses the apples in the manner most cleanly and less liable to produce deleterious affects. Then, if it is true, that infested means a present occupancy, or on act being consummated at the present time, and that the apples are not infested with worms after the time has elapsed for them to make their escape, wherein lies the misdemeanor in selling a few cheap apples to a needy family or for any other person for whatever purpose he may wish to use them. The strict enforcement of this law, if worm holes means infested, signifies that cider mills, vinegar plants, dried apple evaporators, butcher shops or any other person must look elsewhere for their raw material go out of business, or buy apples only of the "fancy packs."

Such an absurdity as this was never contemplated in the law. If the sales can be made to any of the parties mentioned, why should any discrimination run against any other person? The fact of the matter is, if every law on the statute books were strictly enforced there would not be enough of the best of us left to put the rest of us in jail.
