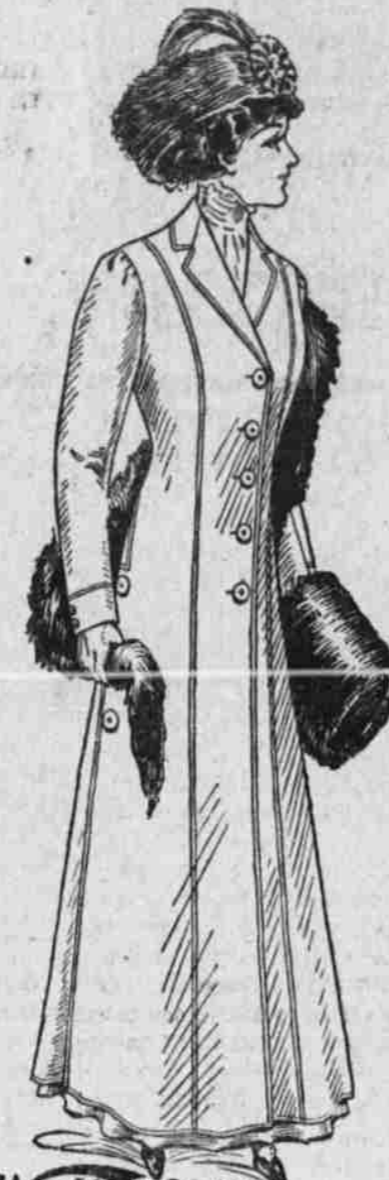

TWO FATAL ACCIDENTS

CHARLES DELANEY DIES OF HIS INJURIES—NEGRO KILLED.

Unknown Negro Decapitated and Body Split Lengthwise.

A coroner's jury met at 3 o'clock this afternoon to deliberate upon the two violent deaths that occurred yesterday upon the railroad. Charles Delaney, the young engine wiper whose tragic fate was detailed in the Observer last evening, died after several hours of terrible agony, through which he was conscious. His brother, James Delaney, started from Missouri last night and is on his way to La Grande at the present time.

At the same hour the jury will pass upon the death of an unknown negro who was riddled and torn to shreds by a train above Hilgard and the body brought into this city last evening. No trace of any possible means of identification could be found on the body. The only objects aside from the unfortunate man's clothing were an old bill-of-fare, and a sack of cigarette tobacco. The negro's body was cut into two separate pieces, lengthwise and his head was off. He had been caught by the car wheels and shaved along several rods before being ripped open.

PREVENT RIOT BY MOURNERS

MILITIA RUSHING TO CHERRY TO FORSTALL TROUBLE.

Serious Complications Believed to be Coming a tThe Mine town.

Cherry, Ills. Nov. 17.—Fearing that the miners of the camp will break out in a riot when the bodies of the 400 victims of the St. Paul mine fire are brought to the surface, two companies of militia today were brought to Cherry and have encamped around the mouth of the mine shaft. The miners of the district are in an ugly mood and claim that the company have needlessly sacrificed the lives of their men in order to save their property. Another company of militia is being held in readiness at Monmouth. Captain Hall, in command of the state troops has issued orders that the militia render all the service that they can to assist in the recovery of the bodies of the victims.

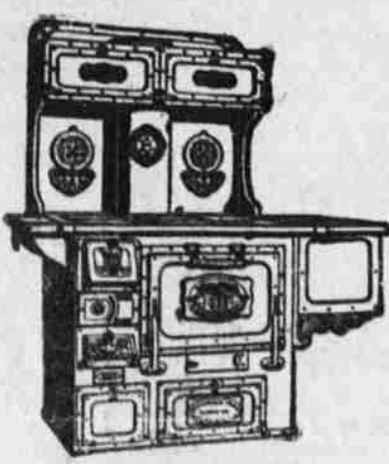
