FAMILY OF FOUR CHILDREN HAVE SEVERE TIME OF IT.

County Asked to Help Thief Valley Trapper Who is Poor.

In a lonely little cabin in Thief valley four children, two sons and two daughters of a trapper by the name of J. H. Hunt, are said to be sick and in want. Upon receipt of the information an order was issued by Judge Henry of the juvenile court and Sheriff Childers will start tomorrow morning to bring the children into this city.

The mother of the children is dead and the father is trying to make a living by trapping. In this he seems to have failed and now that one of the children has fallen ill help has been called for. The names of the boys and girls are Ethel, Ben, Allen, and Hadel Hunt. They will be tried before Judge Henry and will probably be sent to the Boy's and Girl's Aid Society of Portland.

INSTRUCT SCHOOL CLERK

Because of the many inquiries made from the school boards throughout the country regarding the time and manner of voting special district taxes, Superintendent E. E. Bragg is mailing out a letter containing explicit information on the subject to all districts. In the letter Superintendent Bragg cites the school law where it is made the duty of the school clerk to report to the county clerk and the county superintendent on or before December 10 the amount of taxes levied for other purposes.

The following sample notice is suggested: "To vote on the proposition of levying a tax for the maintenance of and for other necessary expenses of the district." Promptness in posting the notices is urged upon the clerks as these notices must be posted ten days before the election. County Clerk Ed. Wright has sent out to each district its property value.
