LITTLE HOPE OF FINDING LIVING MEN IN LOWEST LEVELS OF THE MINES

RESCUERS MISS DEATH BY NARROW MARGIN TODAY.

Now Abandoned-Numerous bodies Bodies are Found.

Cherry, Nov. 23 .- All hope that the miners on the lower levels would be found alive has been abandoned today when it was announced that the tunnels of that level were explored. There were numerous bodies found but no attempt has been made to bring them up and none will be made until the fire second levels and main shaft has been extinguished. The rescue parties that were in the mine had a very narrow covered that dark masses of smoks was coming from the month of the main shaft an instant investigation was made, revealing the second level to again be on fire. Warning was sent to the rescuers in the lower levels and they had scarcely reached the top when the fire from the second levels again had the shaft at its mercy.

Cherry, Ills.
