## WATER SUIT IN PROGRESS

COVE DITCH HEARING CONDUCTED IN THIS CITY.

F. M. Saxton Here To Gather Evidence In the Litigation.

The hearing of the water contest from Cove entitled the Caldwell Ditch Company vs., Claude N. Ogilvie and T. G. Wilson involving the water right on Alex Stackland place, was resumed this morning and occupied the greater portion of the day. The hearing is being conducted in the Commercial Club rooms before Hon. F. M. Saxton, Superintendent of Water Division No. 2.

An interesting feature of the case is that it is the first of the hearings in Union county resulting from the new water law passed by the last legislature. It is the beginning of a contest over the waters of Mill creek near Cove, the claims in which were filed at Cove late in September.

According to the complaint in the case the Caldwell Ditch company appropriated the waters from Mill Creek in 1866 and completed the ditch in 1867. It is disputed that the Stackland place was ever entitled to water from the ditch. Some of the witnesses testified that at one time the holders of water rights along the stream gave Stackland permission to use water in order to avoid trouble.

In regard to the adjudication of the rights along the other streams in Union county, Commissioner Saxton said today that the applications for hearings from Catherine and Murphy Creeks came in late and they would have to be left over for some time as hearings in other portions of Eastern Oregon would come in ahead of them.
