CHAUTAQUA IS DESIRED

UNITED ACTION OF LA GRANDE ORGANIZATIONS DESIRED.

With Co-Operation and Use of Present Equipment Economy Assured.

Enthusiasm for a chautauqua in La Grande is assuming a more definite form at the present time and it is probable that in the near future some united action between the Commercial Club and the Neighborhood Club will be taken to work the matter up and see what can be done. It was the opinion of President Collier of the Commercial Club yesterday that with the use of Riverside Park, the co-operation of the Neighborhood Club and the Commercial Club and the use of the tents now in possession of the Exposition and Fourth of July committees that a Chautauqua could be put in here for about \$1,000.

Several of the enthusiastic chautauqua advocates in this city report that in the cities where they have become well established they are put in at nominal cost and have paid well because of the immense crowd attending. In Peasburg, Ills., a town of about 2,000 inhabitants, the average attendance has been as high as thirty thousand, showing the patronage from the country districts and outlying towns.

It is believed that here the granges and other country kindred organizations would take the matter of an immense tented school, up with vim and that 500 season tickets could be easily sold. Many people who are accustomed to taking their outing in the mountains would be willing to camp at the park and attend the chautauqua.
